## Agric ultural Sec urity Areas

## Agric ultural Security Areas

Farmland owners, in cooperation with local govemments, can establish agricultural sec unity a reas (ASAs) in places where a gric ulture is the primary land use.

Partic ipating farms and landowners benefit from local \& state programs and policies that help to protect farmland and maintain the viability of agric ultural businesses. The ASA program wasstarted in 1981 with the passage of Act 43.

## Eligibility Requirements

At least 250 acres of farmland are needed (collectively) to form an a gric ultural sec unity a rea. ASAs a re usually composed of multiple tracts of farmland owned by multiple owners. ASAscan be created jointly by more than one munic ipality.

To be eligible, fa m properties must:

1. Be at least 10 ac res in size if noncontiguous to other properties that a re in or proposed for inclusion in an ASA.
2. Be viable agricultural land. Cropland, pasture and woodland can all be included in an ASA.
3. Ha ve at least $50 \%$ of the land in Soil Capability Classes I-IV (as mapped \& defined by the Natural Resources Conservation Service).
4. Be located in a zoning district that permits a gric ultural uses.


## Agric ultural Sec urity Area Benefits

There are three important landowner benefits for having farmland included in an a gric ultural sec urity area.

1. La ndowners who have their fa mland enrolled in an ASA of at least 500 acres are eligible to apply to preserve their farms by selling agricultural conservation easements to the Commonwealth and/or Lehigh County.
2. Local govemments are not permitted to enact laws or nuisance ordinances that will unrea sonably restrict farm struc tures and farm practices within their ASAs.
3. It is more diffic ult for local and state govemments to take land in ASAs by eminent doma in for schools, parks, highways a nd other public uses.

Unless a landowner has chosen to preserve their farm with an agric ultural conservation easement, an ASA does not add any restrictions to the use of a property.

## Adding Your Land to an ASA

1. Complete and submit an ASA proposal form to your township office. The proposal must include your printed name, signature, address, taxparcel identification number and acreage of each parcel. ASA proposal forms are available at the Lehigh County Fa rmland Preservation Office.

The proposal form should be submitted to your township by certified mail retum receipt. If hand delivered, a sk for a receipt that includes the date of your submission.
2. If your proposal includesland in more than one township, the proposal form must be submitted to each township where your land is located.
3. The township supervisors should acknowledge receipt of your proposal at their next meeting, publish a notice in the newspa per and post five notices on and near your property stating that your proposal has been received.
4. For 15 days after publishing the notice, the supervisors and the township planning commission may receive other proposals for the modific ation of the ASA.

5. The township supervisors, at the expiration of the 15 day modification period, send your ASA proposal to the township planning commission a nd the township agric ultural sec urity a rea advisory committee for review. The ASA advisory committee is made up of 3 famers, 1 non farmer and 1 supervisor. Each group has up to 45 days to review and comment as to whether or not your land should be added to the ASA.
6. After receiving comments from the planning commission and ASA advisory committee, the supervisors hold an advertised public hearing on your proposed addition to the ASA.
7. Following the public hearing, the supervisors may act to a pprove ordeny the addition of your land to the ASA.
8. The supervisors must make a decision within 180 da ys of the date you submit your proposal form. If the supervisors fail to act within 180 days, your land is automatic ally added to the ASA without modification.
9. Within 10 days of the addition to an ASA, a description of the added land must be filed in the Lehigh County Recorder of Deeds' Office and the PA Department of Agriculture should be notified.
10. An ASA should be reviewed by the township every 7 years. Land can be removed from an ASA at the end of the 7 yearreview process.
