Americans with Disabilities Act Mandate

Memo to Board and Administration

June 26, 2025

Executive Summary

Lehigh County must comply with the DOJ's new ADA Title II web-accessibility rule—published in the Federal Register on April 24 2024 (28 CFR Part 35, Docket CRT-132) [1] — which requires jurisdictions serving 50,000 + residents to meet WCAG 2.1 AA [3] for all websites and mobile apps by April 24 2026 (smaller entities have until April 26 2027). Missing the deadline would put the County out of federal compliance, though the schedule could shift as ADA and broader DEI policy discussions continue.

There is a growing trend of digital accessibility lawsuits and enforcement actions impacting public-sector entities. For example, over 1,100 web accessibility lawsuits [2] were filed in the first quarter of 2024 alone, and plaintiffs are increasingly holding government organizations accountable for their actions.

Top Recommendations:

With the April 24 2026 ADA Title II deadline now less than a year away, Lehigh County has limited time to address its web-accessibility gaps. The first priority is to quantify the County's legal exposure; informed by that assessment, it can then decide on next steps.

Step 1: Legal Risk Assessment

The Board should request that the County Solicitor review the current ADA Title II regulation, confirm the enforcement timeline, and assess Lehigh County's potential legal exposure if the County fails to comply with the 2026 deadline.

Step 2: Technical Accessibility Evaluation

If the Solicitor determines the legal risk to be significant, the County should move quickly to assess its current digital accessibility status. At this stage, the County can choose one of three paths:

- Engage Computer Aid to perform a comprehensive evaluation or
- Contract with TPGi or another firm like them, a nationally recognized accessibility firm already familiar with the County through prior work, or
- Issue an RFP to solicit competitive bids from qualified accessibility consultants.

Initial Approach

TPGi (The Paciello Group Interactive) recently conducted an initial accessibility review for Lehigh County at no cost after meeting our team at a controller's conference.

TPGi, now part of Vispero, is a global leader in digital accessibility. With more than 20 years of experience, it has helped craft WCAG standards, chairs W3C working groups, and serves over 1,000 clients—including AWS projects for U.S. intelligence agencies—alongside Vispero's assistive-technology products such as the JAWS screen reader.

For the review, TPGi did not scan every page. Instead, its analysts applied a representative-component approach: they grouped the site's user-interface elements and content types into logical categories and then examined one or two examples from each category for accessibility issues.

By reviewing representative instances of each major component, we can infer where similar issues might occur across the site.

- **Semantic Grouping of UI Elements:** The site's features were categorized by functionality and semantics (e.g., navigation menus, search forms, video players, maps, document links, etc.). This will allow the reviewer to focus on how each type of element performs in terms of accessibility, with the assumption that the same templates or widgets are reused throughout the site.

Components Identified:

- Navigation menus – e.g., the main site menu and any dropdown sub-menus.
- Search functionality – the site search bar and search results page.
- Video content – an example of embedded video (such as a webcast or informational video on the site).
- Interactive maps or GIS features – for instance, the “Lehigh Valley Breathes” project map or any map showing county information.
- PDF documents and other downloads – links to PDF files and how those files behave in terms of accessibility.
- Miscellaneous/UI elements – such as image carousels, forms (e.g., contact or application forms), and other interactive widgets found on the site.
- **PDF Document Risk:** Notably, Lehigh County's website includes a very large number of PDF files (approximately 6,840 indexed PDF documents were identified via site search in this review). PDF content poses a significant accessibility risk if documents are not correctly formatted. Many PDFs (especially older ones) may lack text recognition, tags, or descriptions, making them unusable with screen readers. While the new ADA Title II rule provides some exceptions for certain pre-existing documents, all documents currently in use for services and any new PDFs created after the compliance date must meet the WCAG 2.1 AA standard. The sheer volume (nearly seven thousand PDFs) means the County should assess how to remediate or replace these documents to ensure equal access.

Limitations: This report is based on a high-level review and not an exhaustive audit. Only a sampling of pages and features were identified. Therefore, specific issues mentioned in this report are examples. There may be additional similar issues elsewhere on the site.

A complete compliance evaluation (including detailed WCAG success criterion testing across templates) is recommended to determine the site's accessibility status conclusively. The findings below highlight areas of concern that warrant further investigation.

Note on Deadline Flexibility:

While the federal government may adjust the April 2026 deadline, especially as ADA compliance becomes more entwined with broader Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) policy debates, the County should proceed under the assumption that the deadline will remain in place, given the legal and reputational risks associated with non-compliance.

Recommendations and Next Steps

Based on the initial review findings and the looming compliance requirements, the Controllers office recommends the following actions for Lehigh County:

1. **Legal Risk Assessment:** The Board should request that the County Solicitor review the current ADA Title II regulation, confirm the enforcement timeline, and assess Lehigh County's potential legal exposure if the County fails to comply with the 2026 deadline

If the solitor determines that the risk level is high

2. **Conduct a Comprehensive Accessibility Audit:** Engage accessibility specialists to perform an in-depth audit of the entire website (templates, pages, and documents). This audit should test against WCAG 2.1 AA success criteria, using both automated tools and manual expert review, including assistive technology testing (screen readers, keyboard-only navigation, etc.). Given the site's scope (especially the large document repository), prioritize critical user paths and high-traffic content in the audit. The audit will confirm the specific issues (potential vs actual barriers) and provide a clear roadmap for remediation.
3. **Develop a Remediation Plan:** Once the audit identifies issues, the County should create a structured plan to fix them. This plan should:
 - Prioritize fixes by impact and frequency of use. For example, issues on the home page or main navigation (affecting all users) and any crucial transaction (like tax payment or emergency information) should be fixed first.
 - Set timelines to address all issues well before April 2026. Some fixes might be quick (adding alt text, adjusting colors in CSS), while others (retrofitting hundreds of PDFs) will require significant effort and possibly additional resources or contractors.
 - Assign responsibilities – determine which internal department or external vendor will do each fix. Web developers may handle code changes; content owners might be tasked with document updates, etc.

4. Remediate Website Templates and Features: Implement the needed changes to the site's HTML/CSS/structure as identified. This may include:
 - Adding proper labels and ARIA attributes to navigation and forms.
 - Ensuring all interactive elements (menus, maps, sliders, etc.) meet accessibility guidelines or providing alternative solutions.
 - Updating color schemes or text styling to meet contrast and readability standards.
 - Improving the site's underlying templates (heading hierarchy, skip links, landmarks for regions like header, main content, footer).
 - Testing after fixes to ensure the issues are resolved.
5. Remediate or Replace PDF Documents: Should legal find that our risk is high, a separate question should be made of the solicitor's office. We should ask Legal whether the county may adopt a go-forward approach—declaring that all PDFs created on or after a specified date (for example, January 1 2026) will meet accessibility standards—or whether the law instead requires remediation of existing documents going back a certain number of years or if there are acceptable alternatives, such as providing clear web notices that accessible versions of older PDFs are available on request. Depending on the outcome the County may need to explore hiring a document remediation service or using software (some AI-based PDF remediation tools exist) to speed this up.
6. Implement Ongoing Monitoring and Training: Accessibility is not a one-time project but an ongoing commitment. The County should:
 - Provide training for web content editors, developers, and document creators on accessibility best practices (so that new content is born accessible).
 - Consider investing in an accessibility monitoring tool or service that can scan the site regularly for common issues (broken alt tags, new PDFs, etc.) and alert the team.
 - Schedule periodic manual tests – for instance, every 6-12 months, have an expert or a user group with disabilities perform user journeys on the site to catch any regressions or new issues.
 - Stay updated on evolving standards (WCAG 2.2 is out, and WCAG 3.0 is on the horizon) and legal expectations.
7. Accessibility Statement and Feedback Mechanism: Publish an updated Accessibility Statement on the website. This statement should affirm the County's commitment to accessibility, acknowledge that work is ongoing, and provide a clear way for users to request assistance or report barriers (for example, an email or phone number for an ADA coordinator or webmaster). Ensure that when users do report issues, the County has a process to respond and address them promptly.
8. Leverage TPGi and Expert Guidance: TPGi's initial review has jump-started this process. The County can continue to consult with TPGi (or another accessibility consultant) for guidance during remediation, to validate fixes, and to provide advanced training. Given the complexities of certain issues (like interactive map accessibility or dealing with third-

party systems), expert advice will help in finding the most reasonable solutions that meet requirements without undue burden.

By executing the above steps, Lehigh County will position itself to meet the ADA Title II web accessibility mandate on time and avoid the pitfalls of litigation that others have faced. More importantly, the County will ensure that all residents, including those with disabilities, can equally access information such as election details, public health updates, services, and civic resources on its website. This aligns with the County's broader mission of serving every constituent and upholding principles of inclusion.

The Bureau of Agricultural Land Preservation & the nine member Sterling Raber Agricultural Land Preservation Board of Lehigh County work to preserve farmland within Lehigh County.

The name of the Board was changed at the end of 2009 to honor Sterling Raber, former County Commissioner and Chairman of the Farmland Preservation Board, for his long-time dedication and commitment to protecting agriculture and rural life in Lehigh County.

Total Acreage

The preservation of farmland is accomplished through the purchase of agricultural conservation easements (also known as the purchase of development rights) on eligible Lehigh County farm properties. As of June 2024, the County Board will have protected **403 Lehigh County farms covering a total of 28,028.26 acres with perpetual agricultural conservation easements (Act 319/515 is NOT Preservation)**

Funding Status (2024)

Lehigh County has allocated \$1,000,000 per year for the purchase of development rights for 2024 and hopes to allocate \$1mil each year 2023 thru 2026. The state has allocated \$2.7mil for Lehigh County in 2024. Lehigh County's total farmland preservation budget for 2024 is \$3.87mil-

The Lehigh County Land Preservation Board reviews the county program's per acre cap each year. **The current cap is \$6,000 an acre.** This is the maximum amount per acre that the Board will pay. The Board will continue to limit the increase in easement value from second opinion appraisals to no more than 50% above the original offer. Second opinion appraisals are not accepted for Out of Order Municipal Partnership easements or Emergency Purchase Easements. Any Board purchase of an easement below the appraisal price might result in income tax breaks. For more information, please see your tax accountant.

Municipal Partnership

In an effort to preserve more farmland and boost funding for the Lehigh County Farmland Preservation Program, the County has developed the Municipal Partnership Program. Please see the [Municipal Partnership Program](#) section for more information.

Waiting List

Preservation applicants are ranked each year following the **July 1st** application deadline. The top-ranking farms are then selected for preservation, based off of available funding. Farms that are not selected are put on a waiting list to be considered in the following year(s) when more funding is available. Currently, there are 40 farms on the waiting list.

Landowner Responsibilities If You Own Preserved Farmland:

Solar Generation on your Preserved Farm:

Solar power generated on your farm can only be used for your farm and NOT sold or used off your property. No commercial solar development or generation is allowed by State Law.

ATTENTION TO ALL OWNERS, SELLERS AND PURCHASERS OF PRESERVED FARMS


ALL new deeds must contain a copy of the Original Deed of Easement...which parcel has the additional house right AND how much building coverage your farm is allowed...SEE "ALP FORMS AND DOCUMENTS" FOR THE INSTRUCTIONS. If your Deeds are not recorded with the correct language as required by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, you will be contacted by our office and required to have your Deed corrected at your cost. This requirement is part of your Deed of Easement!

1. All agricultural production on your land will be conducted in accordance with a Conservation Plan prepared by the Lehigh County Conservation District to protect the soil and water resources on your property. The Plan will be updated whenever there is a change in the farm operation OR ownership.
2. You are permitted to construct new farm buildings and other structures for agricultural production, but it is necessary to abide by municipal building permit and zoning restrictions. The construction of the additional buildings requires an application, review and prior written approval by the Sterling Raber Agricultural Land Preservation Board of Lehigh County. No more than 10% of the conservation easement area can be covered with permanent buildings/structures.
3. The Deed of Agricultural Conservation Easement permits the construction of only one additional residential structure. This new residence can be built to house the owner(s) of the property, farm employees, or an immediate family member. The construction of the additional residence requires an application, review and prior written approval by the Sterling Raber Agricultural Land Preservation Board of Lehigh County.
4. Subdivision is permitted in certain limited circumstances as outlined in the Lehigh County Subdivision Guidelines that were provided to you in the landowner handbook. An application is required and review and prior
5. If you plan to sell or transfer your property, **the entire Deed of Agricultural Conservation Easement must be included verbatim in the new deed(s)**. This is most easily accomplished by making reference to the Deed of Easement and attaching a copy of the recorded Deed of Easement to the new conveyance deed. Please instruct the attorney or title company preparing the new deed used for conveying or transferring the property to include the necessary language. You can also contact the Farmland Preservation Program Office for detailed instructions on how transfer deeds should be prepared.
6. When you sell or transfer your property, you **must** also notify the Lehigh County Agricultural Land Preservation Board, in writing, **before** you sell the property and provide the name, address and telephone number of the prospective new owners.

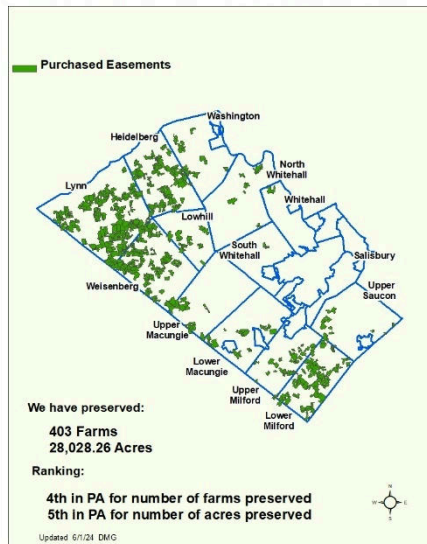

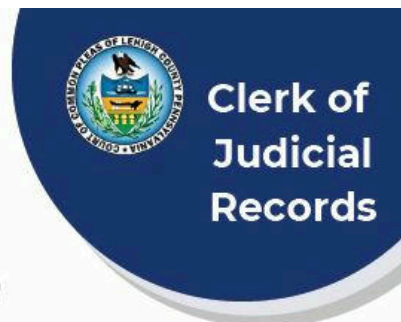

Primary Responsibilities

The **primary responsibilities** of the emergency management division are dictated by the Emergency Management Services Code, and include the following, among others:

1. *To prepare, maintain and keep current an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP).*
2. *To establish, equip and staff an Emergency Operations Center (EOC), consolidated with warning and communications systems.*
3. *To organize, prepare and coordinate all locally available manpower, materials, supplies, equipment, facilities and services necessary for disaster emergency readiness, response and recovery.*
4. *Provide prompt and accurate information regarding local emergencies to appropriate Commonwealth and local officials and agencies and the general public.*

The Department's powers and duties are prescribed by a host of State and Federal legislative acts, including the following:

Each legislative act dictates to a varying degree of responsibility of county government. These responsibilities may require only a mandate to report, or may charge the Department with direction and control.





Description

On Sept. 22, 2014, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Game Commission, confirmed the presence of Spotted Lanternfly Lycophotia tylosis (PHOTED) in Berks County, as part of its responsibility to identify plant-insects, insects and other invasive species, and ensure that they do not harm Pennsylvania's natural resources, trees and economy. On Sept. 22, 2014, the Commonwealth announced a quarantine with the intent to restrict the movement of this pest. This is the first detection of Spotted Lanternfly in the United States.

The Spotted Lanternfly is a plant hopper from Asia, specifically found in China, Korea, India, Vietnam, and parts of eastern Japan. It is an invasive insect in Korea where it was introduced in 2006 and now has affected 25 plant species which also grow in Pennsylvania. In the U.S., it has the potential to greatly impact the grapes, fruit trees and logging industries. This pest attacks many hosts including grapes, apples, pines, oaks and more than 70 additional species. Early detection is vital to the effective control of the pest and the protection of PA businesses and agriculture.

Beginning in late April to early May, nymphs will hatch from egg masses laid on smooth bark, stone, and other vertical surfaces. Nymphs will complete four immature stages. The first stage (I) is black with white spots and angles. As it grows, the Spotted Lanternfly will develop red patches (II) in addition to the white spots. Nymphs spread from their initial site by crawling and feeding on woody and non-woody plants.

Adults can be seen as early as July and take on a much different appearance. Adults at first have a black head and grayish wings with black spots. The box of the wings are a combination of black and white spots with gray outlines. When started in flying the Spotted Lanternfly will display first wings that are red and black with a white spot inside the wing. The red portion of the wings is also adorned with black spots. The abdomen is also a yellowish white with bands of black on the top and bottom. When a poor fly, the Spotted Lanternfly is a strong jumper.

In the fall, adults switch hosts to focus on Tree of Heavens (Ailanthus altissima). This introduced invasive tree is the preferred host that the adults feed on in the fall and is used predominantly for egg laying. However, Tree of Heavens is not the only tree or surface the Spotted Lanternfly will lay eggs on – any smooth surface that is close to which smooth surfaces can provide a protected host for egg masses. Nymphs feed on various plants, including trees, shrubs, and other plants. Some equipment or any other items stored outside and suitable sites for egg laying. Egg laying begins in late September and continues up through the onset of winter.

This pest poses a significant threat to the state's more than \$200 million grape, nearly \$1.4 billion apple, and more than \$24 million stone fruit industries. Fine and hardwood logging in Pennsylvania also accounts for \$12 billion in sales.

Signs and Symptoms:

In the spring search for the nymphs on smaller plants and areas. Fruit trees and grapes can be especially susceptible to damage and mortality under age populations. As the year progresses the Spotted Lanternfly host choice will transition to trees. Trees can be affected with varying amounts of sap on the trunk. Heavy populations can cause trees their canopies to fall up at the base of the tree, hindering the soil around the base. The largest colonies can produce large fungal mats at the base of trees. Increased activity of wasps, hornets, bees, and ants can be seen feeding on honeydew secretions and at tree wounds.

Egg masses can also be found on trees, especially Ailanthus altissima (Tree of Heavens) and other smooth bark trees. Smooth surfaces outdoors such as lawn furniture, stone and brick work, and outdoor recreational vehicles can also harbor egg masses. These masses pose a great risk for the accidental transport of the pest to new areas. Egg masses are present in October and will hatch in the spring starting in early April.

Response:

- Since the pest is new to the United States, the department is reviewing a variety of options including eradication. Currently a quarantine is in place to stop the movement of this pest to new areas and to slow its spread within the quarantine.
- The department is working with other state and federal agencies to develop a comprehensive action plan and host lists useful for control of this pest.
- The quarantine affects a variety of plants, wood and stone products.
- Surveys are currently underway to determine the possible spread of this pest in Berks County and the surrounding counties. Efforts are also underway to remove the Spotted Lanternfly is not present in other parts of the Commonwealth.
- Outdoor recreational areas including recreational vehicles, lawn furniture and toys, stone decks, grills, golf and furniture covers, toys, outdoor furniture, lawns, stone, deck boards, mobile fire pits, any associated equipment and tools or vehicles that stored outdoors.

What to do if you:

See eggs: Scrape them off the tree or smooth surface, double bag them and throw them in the garbage, or place the eggs in alcohol or hand sanitizer to kill them.

Collect a specimen: Turn the adult specimen or egg mass in to the department's Enforcement Lab for verification. First, place the sample in alcohol or hand sanitizer in a leak proof container. A Sample Submission Form can be found in the Publications section below.

Emerald Ash Borer



Emerald Ash Borer

The emerald ash borer is a half-inch long metallic green beetle with the scientific name Agrilus planipennis. Larvae of this beetle feed under the bark of ash trees. Their feeding eventually girdles and kills branches and entire trees. Emerald ash borer was first identified in North America in northeastern Michigan in 2002. In the years since that discovery, the beetle has spread across many states and into Pennsylvania. It has spread across Pennsylvania from west to east. Infestations have been identified in counties adjacent to Lehigh County.

Emerald ash borer feeds exclusively on ash trees in North America. Host species include green ash, white ash, black ash, blue ash, and pumpkin ash. Tens of millions of ash trees have been lost to this pest, which usually kills ash trees within 5-6 years of infestation.

To report possible infested trees in Pennsylvania, contact: The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture 1-800-223-7100

Symptoms of emerald ash borer infestation include upper crown dieback, epicormic branching, bark splits and bark flaking, or tissue damage resulting from woodpecker predation.

Signs of emerald ash borer include the adult beetle or larva, "V" shaped exit holes, and "W" shaped larval galleries under the bark.

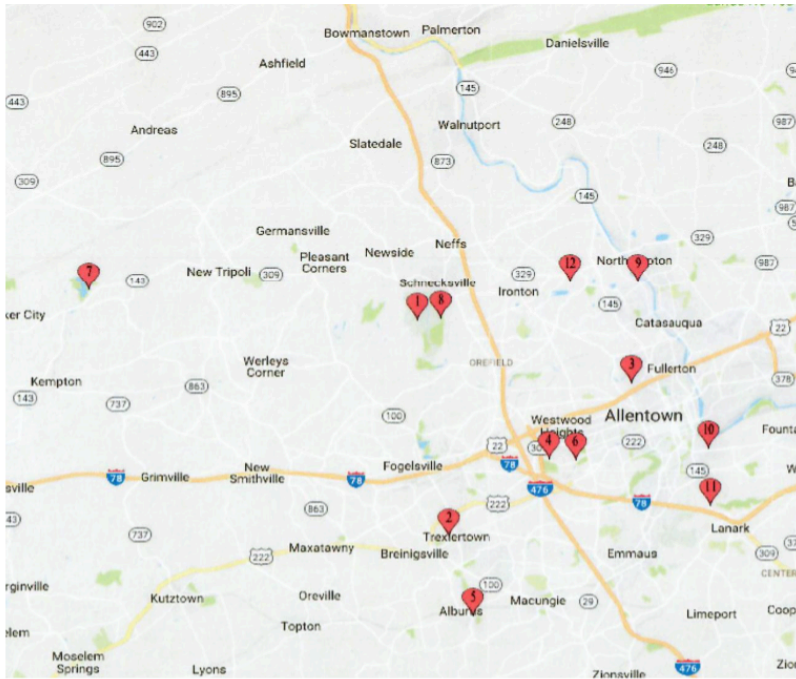

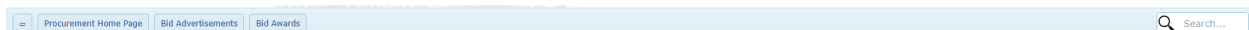

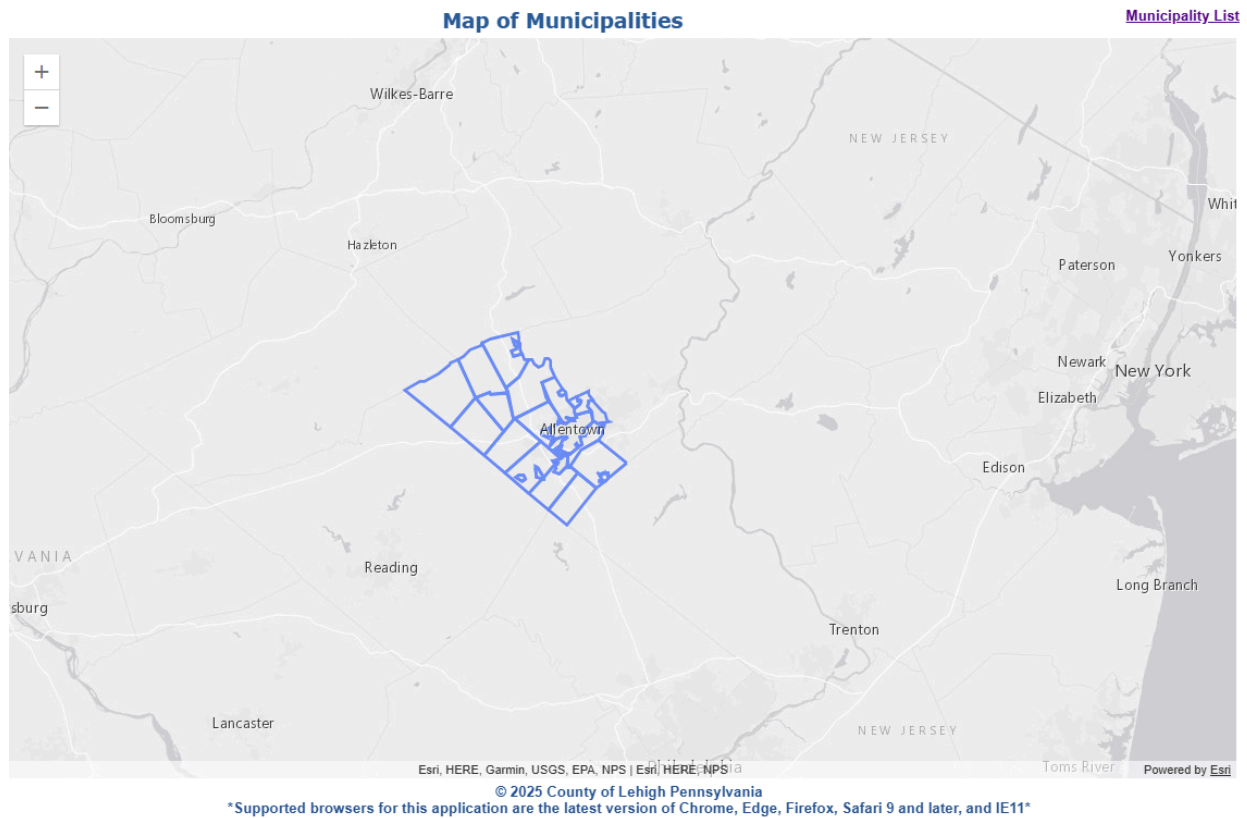

Map of Municipalities

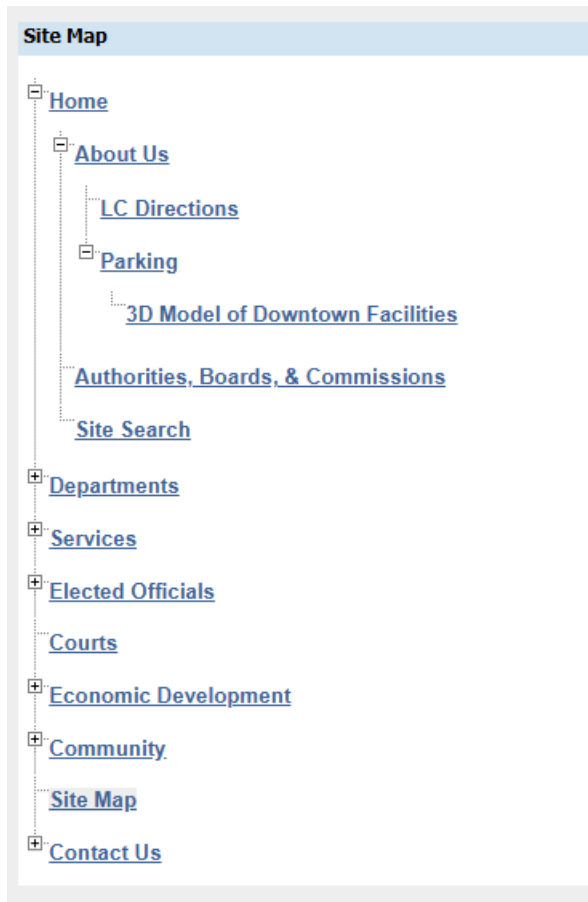

Privacy Statement

Lehigh County is committed to protecting your privacy and developing technology that gives you the most powerful and safe online experience. This Statement of Privacy applies to the Lehigh County Web site and governs data collection and usage. By using the Lehigh County website, you consent to the data practices described in this statement.

Collection of your Personal Information

Lehigh County collects personally identifiable information, such as your e-mail address, name, home or work address or telephone number. Lehigh County also collects anonymous demographic information, which is not unique to you, such as your ZIP code, age, gender, preferences, interests and favorites.

There is also information about your computer hardware and software that is automatically collected by Lehigh County . This information can include: your IP address, browser type, domain names, access times and referring Web site addresses. This information is used by Lehigh County for the operation of the service, to maintain quality of the service, and to provide general statistics regarding use of the Lehigh County Web site.

Please keep in mind that if you directly disclose personally identifiable information or personally sensitive data through Lehigh County public message boards, this information may be collected and used by others. Note: Lehigh County does not read any of your private online communications.

Lehigh County encourages you to review the privacy statements of Web sites you choose to link to from Lehigh County so that you can understand how those Web sites collect, use and share your information. Lehigh County is not responsible for the privacy statements or other content on Web sites outside of the Lehigh County and Lehigh County family of Web sites.

Use of your Personal Information

Lehigh County collects and uses your personal information to operate the Lehigh County Web site and deliver the services you have requested. Lehigh County also uses your personally identifiable information to inform you of other products or services available from Lehigh County and its affiliates. Lehigh County may also contact you via surveys to conduct research about your opinion of current services or of potential new services that may be offered.

Lehigh County does not sell, rent or lease its customer lists to third parties. Lehigh County may, from time to time, contact you on behalf of external business partners about a particular offering that may be of interest to you. In those cases, your unique personally identifiable information (e-mail, name, address, telephone number) is not transferred to the third party. In addition, Lehigh County may share data with trusted partners to help us perform statistical analysis, send you email or postal mail, provide customer support, or arrange for deliveries. All such third parties are prohibited from using your personal information except to provide these services to Lehigh County , and they are required to maintain the confidentiality of your information.

Lehigh County does not use or disclose sensitive personal information, such as race, religion, or political affiliations, without your explicit consent.

Lehigh County keeps track of the Web sites and pages our customers visit within Lehigh County , in order to determine what Lehigh County services are the most popular. This data is used to deliver customized content and advertising within Lehigh County to customers whose behavior indicates that they are interested in a particular subject area.

Lehigh County Web sites will disclose your personal information, without notice, only if required to do so by law or in the good faith belief that such action is necessary to: (a) conform to the edicts of the law or comply with legal process served on Lehigh County or the site; (b) protect and defend the rights or property of Lehigh County ; and, (c) act under exigent circumstances to protect the personal safety of users of Lehigh County , or the public.

Use of Cookies

The Lehigh County Web site use "cookies" to help you personalize your online experience. A cookie is a text file that is placed on your hard disk by a Web page server. Cookies cannot be used to run programs or deliver viruses to your computer. Cookies are uniquely assigned to you, and can only be read by a web server in the domain that issued the cookie to you.

One of the primary purposes of cookies is to provide a convenience feature to save you time. The purpose of a cookie is to tell the Web server that you have returned to a specific page. For example, if you personalize Lehigh County pages, or register with Lehigh County site or services, a cookie helps Lehigh County to recall your specific information on subsequent visits. This simplifies the process of recording your personal information, such as billing addresses, shipping addresses, and so on. Lehigh County secures your personal information from unauthorized access, use or disclosure. Lehigh County secures the personally identifiable information you provide on computer servers in a controlled, secure environment, protected from unauthorized access, use or disclosure. When personal information (such as a credit card number) is transmitted to other Web sites, it is protected through the use of encryption, such as the Secure Socket Layer (SSL) protocol.
