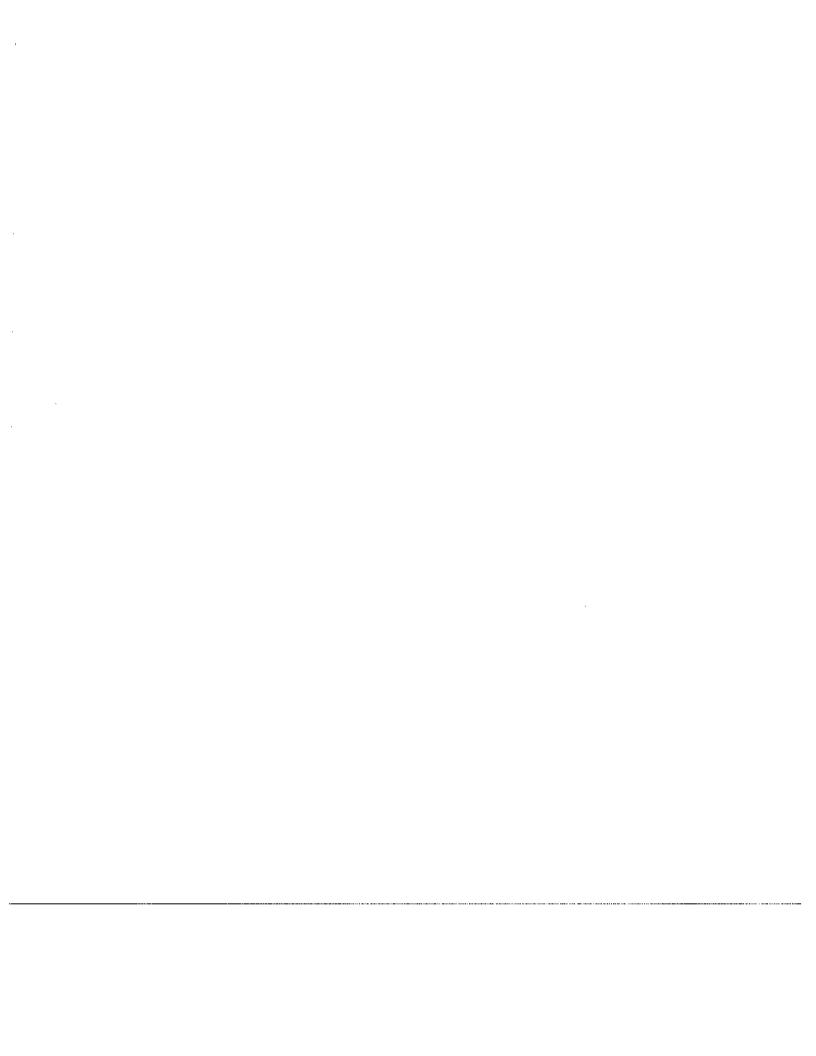

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Board of Directors Haven House Allentown, PA

#### Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Haven House (A Not-for-Profit Corporation), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Haven House as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Haven House and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Haven House's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

## Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether
  due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks.
   Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and
  disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
  procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing
  an opinion on the effectiveness of Haven House's internal control. Accordingly, no such
  opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Haven House's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

#### Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The Schedules of Budgeted, Reported and Allowable Costs on pages 21–23 are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

# 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

## Nature of Activities

Haven House (the "Organization") is a not-for-profit corporation organized under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the purpose of providing non-residential programs for adults with mental illness who require intensive and comprehensive treatment at their location in Allentown, Pennsylvania. The treatment focus is to evaluate, support and maintain levels of independent functioning consistent with the demands of living in the community, and to prevent deterioration and to improve the quality of life.

## Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and in accordance with the principles of not-for-profit accounting generally accepted in the United States of America. The financial statements reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

#### Basis of Presentation

The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to the following classes of net assets:

**Without Donor Restrictions** - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Net assets without donor restrictions may be designated for specific purposes by the action of the Board of Directors.

With Donor Restrictions – Net assets that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions that will be satisfied by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time. When a restriction is satisfied, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Also included in this category are net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that require the net assets to be maintained indefinitely while permitting the Organization to expend the income generated in accordance with the provisions of the contribution.

## Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

# Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash held in checking and money market accounts, with an initial maturity of three months or less. Cash held in investments is excluded from cash and cash equivalents.

# 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Accounts Receivable

The Organization accounts for bad debts using the allowance method. Bad debt expense is recognized during the period in which a specific account is determined to be uncollectible. The Organization periodically reviews its receivables for collectability based on past experience with the customer or current economic conditions. At June 30, 2023 and 2022, the Organization recorded an allowance for doubtful accounts of \$63,939 and \$60,309, respectively.

#### Restriction of Assets

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction is satisfied, restricted net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

The Organization reports gifts of land, buildings and equipment as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long these assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expiration of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service.

#### Grant and Contract Support and Receivables

The Organization receives its program service revenue and contract support primarily from Lehigh and Northampton counties and their designated managed care provider and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare for services rendered to clients. Grant and contract support are reported at estimated realizable values.

Significant concentrations of grant and contract net receivables exists with Medicare, Lehigh County, Northampton County and their designated managed care provider Magellan Behavioral Health of Pennsylvania, Inc.

Accounts receivable are stated at outstanding balance less an allowance for doubtful accounts, when applicable. Management periodically evaluates the adequacy of the allowance. Accounts are written off when they are determined to be uncollectible based on management's assessment of the individual account.

# Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

## Revenue from Contracts with Customers

The Organization's revenue from contracts with customers that fall within the scope of ASC 606 is recognized within Contracts, Program Service, and Private Pay Revenue. Revenues are recognized as the Organization satisfies its obligation to the customer. Services within the scope of ASC 606 include providing residential and non-residential programs for adults with mental illness who require intensive and comprehensive treatment.

The Organization's revenue streams within the scope of ASC 606 are accounted for in the following segments:

Contracts, Program Service, and Private Pay Revenue – The Organization earns program revenue by providing services for adults with mental illnesses daily at its Lehigh and Northampton County locations. The service hours are tracked as incurred. At the conclusion of each month, the service hours are accumulated, and the funder is billed. The payment for services is typically received the following month.

Program revenues are primarily recognized when the services are rendered. All services covered by a contract, managed-care provider, or self-pay are rendered, completed, and billed within the fiscal year. The Organization does not receive program revenue from contracts, managed-care providers, or self-pay in advance of the service provided. No portion of the service revenue is deferred at year-end as all revenue is recognized within the fiscal year.

#### Contributions 5 4 1

Contributions received are recorded as net assets without donor restrictions or net assets with donor restrictions, as defined above.

#### Contributed Nonfinancial Assets

No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for contributed nonfinancial assets. The Organization receives donated goods for use in programs that fulfill the mission, however, these goods typically do not meet the materiality threshold for inclusion in the financial statements. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. Many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks to assist the Organization, however, these donated services are not reflected in the financial statements since the services do not require specialized skills. The Organization estimates donated goods received during the year ended June 30, 2023 totaled \$52,000, however, the Organization would not have purchased these goods for use in their programs had the goods not been donated. Therefore, the value of the donated goods are not included in the financial statements of the Organization.

## <u>Expenses</u>

Expenses are recorded when incurred in accordance with the accrual basis of accounting.

# 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Allocation of Expenses by Functional and Natural Classification

Costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities and in the statements of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among various programs, supporting and fundraising services benefited.

The Organization's method for allocating expenses among the functional reporting classifications which cannot be specifically identified as program or supporting services are based on estimates made for time spent by key personnel between functions, space occupied by function, consumption of supplies and postage by functions, and other objective bases.

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions, other than donated property and equipment, are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets, which range from three to thirty-nine years and is computed on the straight-line method. The Organization has a policy to capitalize all purchases greater than \$1,000 with a useful life of one year or more.

Maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed.

Donations of property and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service. The Organization reclassifies restricted net assets to net assets without donor restrictions at that time.

#### Compensated Absences

The Organization allows for carryover of a portion of paid time off. The Organization records a liability for employee's rights to receive compensation for future absences.

#### Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Organization maintains cash balances at financial institutions which may, at times, exceed federally insured limits. It historically has not experienced any credit related losses. At June 30, 2023 and 2022, the Organization's bank accounts exceeded the Federal Deposit Insurance Company limits of \$250,000. The Organization's uninsured cash totals were \$916,618 and \$1,232,705, respectively.

At June 30, 2023 and 2022, 61% and 61%, respectively, of the Organization's accounts receivable were from Magellan Behavioral Health of Pennsylvania, Inc.

# 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Income Taxes

The Organization is a not-for-profit corporation organized under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting guidance as codified in Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 740, *Income Taxes* – *Uncertainty in Income Taxes*, establishes the criterion that an individual tax position has to meet for some or all of the benefits of the position to be recognized in the Organization's financial statements. The standard prescribes a recognition threshold of more likely-than-not to be sustained upon examination by a taxing authority. Measurement of the tax uncertainty occurs if the recognition threshold has been met. The standard also prescribes guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties and disclosure. The Organization had no material uncertain income tax positions that would result in a liability to the Organization at June 30 2023 and 2022, respectively.

The Organization files its 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Tax, with the United States Internal Revenue Service and with the Bureau of Charitable Organizations in Pennsylvania.

## Reclassification

Certain amounts in the prior year financial statements have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation. The reclassification did not have an effect on net assets.

#### Adoption of New Accounting Standard

The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued an Accounting Standards Update that affects the Organization, as noted below.

Effective July 1, 2022, the Organization adopted ASU 2016-02, *Leases*, (Topic 842). Topic 842 was issued to increase transparency and comparability among entities by recognizing lease assets and lease liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position and disclosing key information about leasing arrangements. Under the provisions of Topic 842, a lessee is required to recognize a right-of-use asset and lease liability, initially measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments, on the Statement of Financial Position. In addition, lessees are required to provide qualitative and quantitative disclosures that enable users to understand more about the nature of the leasing activities.

# 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Adoption of New Accounting Standard (Continued)

The Organization elected the option to apply the transition requirements at the effective date of July 1, 2022, which allows the effects of initially applying Topic 842 to be recognized as a cumulative effect adjustment to net assets in the period of adoption. Consequently, the financial statements and disclosures required under Topic 840 have not been updated as of and for the year ended June 30, 2022. The Organization also elected the package of practical expedients, which permits the Organization to not reassess prior conclusions about lease identification, classification, and initial direct costs and to account for the lease and nonlease components of such as maintenance as a single lease component. The Organization elected the short-term lease recognition exemption for all leases that qualify under Topic 842. In addition, the Organization elected to apply a de minimis measurement and recognition exemption to all leases which contain payments that are less than \$1,000 per month.

The Organization has determined that the implementation of ASU 2016-02, *Leases*, did not significantly impact the financial statements and, therefore, no right-of-use asset and lease liability were recorded.

## 2. Property and Equipment

Property and equipment consist of the following:
