Awards for individual achievements are given to a person from Lehigh and from Northampton County for each category.

All nominations must include a detailed narrative describing the reason(s) for the nomination. <u>Check only one award</u> <u>category for each form</u>. To nominate an individual in more than one category, use a separate form & narrative for each nomination. <u>Please attach additional paper if needed to provide sufficient/specific details</u>. The more info the better your person's chance of being chosen for an award.

Awards Descriptions

- Vocational Achievement Someone who has made great progress over the past year, has acquired a new skill, attained a new position/promotion, has good attendance, and has a positive attitude about work (includes sheltered employment).
- Employment Achievement Someone who is successfully employed in a job in the community or who has had a job in the community over the past year.
- □ <u>*Educational Achievement*</u> Someone in an educational setting who has made great educational progress over the past year, is motivated to learn, & is a positive influence on others.
- □ <u>*Transition Achievement*</u> Someone who has acquired a new skill or participated in activities that will enable him/her to attain a job or greater independence in life after school. Someone who is an inspiration to teachers and other students.

□ <u>Exemplary Citizenship</u> - Someone who has made contributions to the family, school, and community, specifically with actions that put others first. Someone who has moved beyond significant hardships or difficulties to enhance the lives of others.

□ <u>*Personal Achievement*</u> - Someone who has made great strides in reaching personal goals and who has enriched his/her own capabilities and thereby opened the door for others to achieve as well.

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Pennsylvania LINK

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What is Pennsylvania LINK?

Pennsylvania LINK to Aging and Disability Resources is a nationwide effort between the U.S. Administration on Aging and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

Pennsylvania LINK came to the Lehigh Valley in 2010 to provide information and linkages to long-term care services

and supports for people over 60 and adults with disabilities. There are currently 15 LINKs throughout Pennsylvania covering 67 counties.

In Lehigh and Northampton County we work together to improve access to long-term care supports through a network of partners, promote consumer directed decision making, and enhance efficiency and quality of service.

LINK to Aging and Disability Resources is designed to be a coordinated network of partner agencies allowing consumers to initiate contact with any LINK network partner and experience the same access to information, assistance and resources.

What does this mean? A consumer should directly or seamlessly be connected to information and services needed, no matter the initial point of entry into the system.



The "no wrong door" approach attempts to minimize duplication of efforts by consumer and providers. How does LINK accomplish this? This goal is accomplished through outreach, education, and networking with providers and the community. Lehigh-Northampton LINK schedules speakers and trainings; holds partner meetings to network with each other; shares information, resources, and new initiatives; and holds workshops for organizations and folks in the community. Because of these collaborations, LINK partners are more efficiently and effectively assisting individuals navigate the complex system of program and services.
