



# Why do some drug users become addicted, while others don't?

- Family history of addiction
- Abuse, neglect, or traumatic experiences in childhood
- Mental disorders
- Early use of drugs
- Method of administration

# Impact of Substance Abuse

### **Use by a Parent**

- Family Dynamics
  - Conflict
  - Untrustworthy
  - Children experience similar problems to those sexually or physically abused
  - What is Normal?
- Work Performance
- Court Involvement
- Out of home placement

### Use by the Child

- Social Emotional Consequences
- Court Involvement
- Biological Developmental
  - Brain development
  - Other organs
- Early onset of substance abuse leads to lifelong problems
  - Adult usage much more significant (more than 3 drugs)

### Substance Abuse Does Not Occur In A Vacuum 20 - 35% of Suicides 50% of 62% of Traffic Assaults **Fatalities** Alcohol & Drugs 49% of 52% of are associated Murders Rapes\* with 68% of 80% of Manslaughter Child Abuse Charges Spousal Abuse Drownings

Pennsylvania has the 14th Highest Drug Overdose Mortality Rate in the United States

There has been an 89% increase from 1999 – 2010!

# 2013 PAYS Data (Pennsylvania Youth Survey)

200,622 valid participants in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12

 Participation rate of 69.5%, represented evenly across the state.

## Compared pationally:

- Significant increases (i.e., increase of roughly 0.9% or more) since the 2011 survey were:
- Marijuana use (0.9% increase in the 10th grade);
- ✓ Lifetime alcohol use (8.3% increase in the 10th grade, 3.8% increase in the 12th grade, and 2.9% increase for all grades combined);
- ✓ Lifetime narcotic prescription druguse (1.0% increase for the 6th grade).

## 2013 PAYS Data

### As a State....

- Lifetime alcohol use was higher in PA than the national rates
  - 8<sup>th</sup> grade (7.3% higher)
  - 10<sup>th</sup> grade (9.4% higher)
  - 12<sup>th</sup> grade (6.0% higher)
- 46.9% of students in grades 6<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> have used alcohol at least once in their lifetime.
  - 13.3% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders
  - 35.1% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders
  - 61.5% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders
  - 74.2% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders



## 2013 PAYS Data

- Percentage of students binge drinking (consumed 5 or more drinks in a row) at least once in the past 2 weeks: 1.3% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders, 3.1% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 11.7% of 10<sup>th</sup> graders, and 21.8% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders.
- 50.2% of 6<sup>th</sup> graders indicate they received a substance from their parent(s) in the past month. Of all students combined, 56.4% indicate getting a substance from a friend in the past month.
- 40.3% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders report using marijuana at least once in their life. Whereas 21.8% of 12<sup>th</sup> graders report using marijuana at least once in the past 30 days.

# Reality Check

### **National**

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), January 2014 report:

65.6% of illicit drug use begins with the use of marijuana

### **Lehigh County and State**

Based upon the 2013 PAYS, of the 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> graders who reported marijuana use within the last 30 days...

1,125 kids in Lehigh County and 61,523 kids in PA will begin the use of other illicit drugs





#### 1. Education

- A. Prevention: Universal and open to all residents
- B. Programs: include Current Trends, ATOD, FASD, Impaired Driving, Senior Adult Medication Misuse and Substance Use, Gambling, and CHOICES.
- C. Over 10,000 hours of direct prevention programming occur each year within Lehigh County.
- D. Locations: Anywhere people Gather

### 2. Early Identification

- A. Intervention: Targeted, High Risk Indicators and Early Stages of Use
- B. Programs: Re-Entry, CHOICS and Student Assistance Program (SAP)
  - 1. Re-Entry: Within Lehigh County Jail and Work Release
  - 2. CHOICES: 1 of 26 Nationally programs nationally recognized by SAMHSA as a top promising practice. Data driven, outcome oriented.
  - 3. SAP: Student Assistance Program an annual average of over 800 behavioral health assessments.
