

Crisis Intervention



Lehigh County Crisis Intervention provides **immediate** support for crisis situations, as well as assistance with managing recurring or future crisis situations. Crisis support is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and is available to all people located in Lehigh County, including **children**, **teens**, **and adults**.

Crisis Intervention can assist with providing supportive listening, assistance with developing strategies for reducing recurring

crisis, advising of least restrictive alternatives to hospitalization, as well as assistance with consumers who are a danger to themselves or others. Crisis Intervention can also provide services connecting to local community resources.

Crisis Intervention provides services via telephone, walk in, or mobile units.

Outpatient Treatment

During times of crisis, it is normal for stress levels to rise where a form of voluntary treatment is necessary. Outpatient mental health treatment is a general term for treatment that takes place in an office, hospital, or clinical setting that involves no overnight stay, unlike residential or inpatient treatment. Outpatient treatment can be fit to meet the needs of each individual treated. Treatment can range from therapy, group therapy, psychiatric evaluations, medication management, and much more.





The Lehigh County Pardon Project

The Pardon Project of Lehigh County was created to help members of the community who were convicted of a non-violent crime, completed their sentence for at least five years, and their past is holding them back from pursuing their full potential. A pardon is total forgiveness by the state and a powerful tool for people who deserve a second chance. In Pennsylvania, the pardon process is free and more accessible than ever. Under Lehigh County Executive Phil Armstrong's Administration, there is now a Pardon Coordinator embedded in the Public Defender's Office. Guidelines to qualify for the Lehigh County Pardon Project are the same financial guidelines used to qualify residents for legal representation

through the Lehigh County Public Defender's Office. In addition, there are guidelines regarding which cases the Pardon Project will accept. The potential benefits of a pardon are significant and can create a range of opportunities that may not have been available otherwise. Lehigh County wants to help its residents realize this opportunity.




Sheriff's Office 610-782-3175

Lehigh Valley Breathes Project



Launched in August of 2023, the Lehigh valley breathes is a project led by Lehigh and Northampton Counties to obtain and communicate localized information about particulate air pollution in the Lehigh Valley. The primary purpose it designed to provide policy makers and citizens with information needed to help improve the air we all breathe. The project is designed to enable and engage citizens in learning about air quality and participating in decisions that affect air quality.

Both Lehigh and Northampton Counties provide project updates monthly on the last week of the month, available through each county's Lehigh Valley Breathes webpage, social media, as well as through the project email list.

Updates include topics such as current project status, including the number of air monitors installed, observations as project data is acquired, opportunities for residents to be involved in the project, and pertinent news and information regarding air quality issues of both local and general interest. The data collection is planned to run for a year following the completed monitor installation.

Wire Mill Bridge Re-Opening

The Wire Mill Bridge was reopened in July of 2023 following a period of delay due to utility improvements that impacted the project's schedule. The Lehigh County owned bridge crosses the Little Lehigh Creek and carries S. Lehigh Street, S.R. 145, located in the City of Allentown. It provides an efficient transportation grid from Center City to Southside Allentown.

The newly built bridge boasts four lanes of traffic, with two lanes in each direction, along the addition sidewalks. The bridge handles approximately 15,000 vehicles daily, and has significantly improved the flow of traffic and ensured smoother commutes.

The reopening of the Wire Mill Bridge is thanks to the collaborative efforts of Lehigh County, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, Kinsely Construction, and the City of Allentown.

911 Communications Center Update

On January 10th, 2024, the Lehigh County 911 Communications Center and Lehigh County Executive Phillips Armstrong held a press conference to announce the newest Communications Center update which will allow video access to the site via caller cameras and live streaming. The caller, with 911 leadership, can share video information to support the emergency response. This is a supplemental tool that is intended to be used in conjunction with normal call taking procedures. At no time shall a dispatch be delayed in order to obtain information from the video call. This will aid firefighters in seeing potential hazards before they enter and police in "knowing before they go".







"A picture is worth a thousand words," said Lehigh County Executive Phil Armstrong. "In emergency situations every minute counts and being able to access video helps our 911 operators quickly assess emergency situations."





- CMS Data: Used to determine the performance of nursing homes.

- Management of the Covid-19 situation: A Covid-19 score for each facility was calculated, with the objective to award nursing homes which have had the best possible response and protocols during the pandemic.
- Resident Satisfaction Data: National Patient Safety Goals from the Joint Commission and Google reviews were included.
- Accreditation: Data on nursing homes provided by The Joint Commission (TJC) and Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF).

Based on the results of the study, Cedarbrook Senior Care and Rehab is ecstatic to be recognized as one of Newsweek's America's Best Nursing Homes 2024.



IF YOU WASH YOUR CAR IN THE DRIVEWAY, YOU MIGHT AS WELL WASH IT IN THE LAKE.



Rain washes pollutants into storm drains which flows directly into our streams, lakes, rivers and the ocean. So what can you do?

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH WASHING YOUR CAR?

Washing your car on a paved surface can allow the soapy wash water and other pollutants, like oil and grease, to run off into a storm drain. Most soap contains phosphates and other chemicals that, in large amounts can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. The soap, together with the dirt and oil washed from your car, flows into nearby storm drains, which flows directly into lakes, rivers and the ocean. The phosphates from the soap can cause excess algae to grow, which can be harmful to the water quality.


YOU CAN HELP!

- Take your car to a car washing facility, rather than washing it yourself. Commercial car washes treat and recycle the water.
- If you can't get to a car washing facility, wash your car on an unpaved surface and use biodegradable soap.
- Organize a Car Wash Fundraiser for a local organization.

WHY SHOULD YOU CARE ABOUT CLEAN WATER?

Stormwater pollution is one of the greatest threats to Pennsylvanias clean water supply. Clean water provides access to safe drinking water, places for recreation, commercial opportunities, healthy wildlife habitats, and adds beauty to our landscape. Rain washes pollution from streets, parking lots, and lawns into storm drains, then directly to our streams, rivers, lakes and oceans.

Did you know more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like motor oil, fertilizers, pet waste, and detergents? By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater.





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5 STEPS for Creating a Rain Garden

Stormwater runoff is a major cause of water pollution in streams and rivers

Rain gardens are shallow depressions that are planted with deep-rooted native and non-native adaptive plants and grasses. They are:

- Designed to collect rain water that runs off rooftops or lawns
- Areas that capture stormwater runoff, allowing it to soak into the ground. This recharges groundwater and naturally filters out pollutants.
- · A source of food and habitat for birds and butterflies

Creating a rain garden not only shows your interest in protecting the environment, but also can be a beautiful addition to a home landscape.



5 STEPS FOR CREATING A RAIN GARDEN

Pick the spot



- Contact local utilities by calling 811 to have them mark locations of underground wires, cables, or pipes
- A rain garden should be at least 10 feet from foundations and fence posts, and 25 feet from septic system drain fields and well heads

Outline garden and determine depth



- The average size of a home rain garden is 70 square feet (7 x 10 feet), but the size can vary based on how much water you want to catch
- Gardens should be no more than 6 to 12 inches deep
- Make sure the garden is not flat because you need a depression to capture water

Select the plants

- Select native and non-native adaptive plants that can tolerate "wet feet" in the lowest places
- Determine how many plants are needed based on your rain garden size and the mature plant dimensions

Dig in



- The depression in your rain garden should be marked and dug to the depth you determined in Step 2.
- Without a depression, the rain garden will not work.
- Make sure not to compact the soil this is the leading cause of failed gardens
- Place each plant at its minimum distance from other plants

Finish-Up



- Install mulch or sphagnum moss to keep weeds out and retain moisture
- Water the garden each day for the first week, and then gradually reduce watering over the next three weeks. After a month, normal rain should be enough to keep plants healthy.
- Regular maintenance is required to keep your rain garden looking good and functioning well


Tips for Managing Your Rain Garden


 Don't worry about mosquitoes. Your rain garden should not retain water long enough for mosquitoes to have an opportunity to breed

- Your rain garden will contain flow from light rains, however, will fill up and overflow during heavy rains
- · You may direct your downspout to the rain garden by digging a shallow swale or by routing it through a drain pipe
- If your soil lacks organic material, you may dig the depression an additional 2 to 3 inches and fill in with peat moss or compost


Be creative by adding decorative items such as stones and garden ornaments to enhance your rain garden

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






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HOW TO STAY SAFE when a thunderstorm threatens

Lightning is a leading cause of injury and death from weather-related hazards



- Know your area's risk of thunderstorms. They can occur year-round and at any hour.
- Sign up for your community's warning system. The Emergency Alert System (EAS) and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts.
- Identify sturdy buildings close to where you live, work, study, and play.
- Cut down or trim trees that may be in danger of falling on your home.
- Consider buying surge protectors, lightning rods, or a lightning protection system to protect your home, appliances, and electronic devices.
- Secure outside furniture.



- When thunder roars, go indoors. A sturdy building is the safest place to be during a thunderstorm.
- Pay attention to weather reports and warnings of thunderstorms. Be ready to change plans, if necessary, to be near shelter.
- When you receive a thunderstorm warning or hear thunder, go inside immediately.
- If indoors, avoid running water or using landline phones. Electricity can travel through plumbing and phone lines.
- **Protect your property.** Unplug appliances and other electric devices.
- If boating or swimming, get to land and find a sturdy, grounded shelter or vehicle immediately.
- If necessary, take shelter in a car with a metal top and sides. Do not touch anything metal.
- Avoid flooded roadways. Turn Around Don't Drown®. Just six inches of fast-moving water can knock you down, and one foot of moving water can sweep your vehicle away.



- Listen to authorities and weather forecasts for information on whether it is safe to go outside and instructions regarding potential flash flooding.
- Watch for fallen power lines and trees. Report them immediately.
